## Racomitrium ellipticum

Oval-fruited Fringe-moss





Identification The dark green, brownish or occasionally reddish-brown cushions of this small (shoots 0.5–2 cm tall) Racomitrium are seldom seen without their shiny, dark brown capsules. These are distinctly short (less than 1.5 mm) and round compared with those of most British Racomitrium species, and are held up above the cushions on a long seta. The leaves of R. ellipticum are 2-3 mm long, taper to a blunt tip with no hair point, and because they are 2 cells thick, they look distinctly opaque through a hand lens.

Similar species The shiny, oval, dark brown capsules are distinctive, as other Racomitrium species either have long, narrow capsules, or the egg-shaped capsules are green or light brown, and matt. Hair points can be found on most forms of R. sudeticum (p. 536) (which has egg-shaped capsules); those without hair points do not have the opaque leaves of R. ellipticum. The leaves of Grimmia atrata (p. 524) curl up much more than those of R. ellipticum when dry, and G. atrata rarely produces capsules. Ulota hutchinsiae (p. 663) grows in similarly dark green cushions on upland rocks, but has longer capsules that are ribbed when dry, and covered by a hairy calyptra when unripe.

Habitat A locally frequent plant of uplands in western Britain. R. ellipticum grows on periodically flushed, usually igneous rocks. It is found primarily in shaded gullies and on north-facing outcrops, but sometimes descends onto rocks beside lochs.
